Mixed effects models are commonly used to analyze longitudinal data when the outcomes are continuous and non-linear mixed effects models are used when the outcomes are binary. These models, however, do not model more complex relationships between predictors and outcomes such as mediation. Structural equation models are a general modeling framework that can analyze complex relationships between variables including mediation. They are more commonly used in social science research but are becoming more common in clinical research. We performed three sets of simulation studies to address the performance of mixed effects models and non-linear mixed effects models. We examined three scenarios of mediated longitudinal data: (1) continuous outcomes with binary predictor and continuous mediator measured at one time, (2) continuous outcomes with binary predictor and continuous mediator measured repeatedly and (3) binary outcomes with binary predictor and continuous mediator measured repeatedly. We compared the estimated total effect of the binary predictor on the outcome in the mixed model or non-linear mixed model compared to a structural equation model (SEM) that specifically modeled the mediated data relationship. We found that the mixed model excluding the mediating variable performed sufficiently well when compared to the structural equation model in mediated continuous longitudinal data. The primary advantage of the SEMs in this scenario was the ability to specifically model the direct and indirect components of the total effect. For binary outcome data, when a logit link between the predictor and outcome was assumed, the non-linear mixed effects model performed adequately once correctly scaled. In the case of a probit link, the performance exceeded that of the SEM fit with Mplus since Mplus produced positively biased results. With continuous longitudinal data, mixed effects models excluding the mediated variable sufficiently estimated the total effect of the predictor on the

outcome. With binary longitudinal data, non-linear mixed effects models performed sufficiently, although more care was needed to correctly scale the estimates.
